Call for Proposals

An analytical study of police budgets in India

The Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative (CHRI) is calling for proposals for an analytical study on police budgets in India.

The study will analyse the budget of one police organisation (Delhi police) for a period of three years, in terms of process, allocation of resources, spending and reporting.

The call for proposals is for the designing, research and writing of the study. The designing will be done in consultation with the CHRI team, while the research and writing will be done independently with feedback from the team as required, and through a clear process agreed upon.

Applicants may be individuals or organisations. The applicant will need to have proven expertise and experience in budget analysis, researching and writing reports of a comparable nature to the current study.

The proposal should contain:

- An outline of the proposed study
- Credentials and qualifications of the applicant including details of previous work (please provide attachments or links)
- Timeline
- An estimate of costs

Proposals should be sent to Devika Prasad, Programme Coordinator, Police Reforms Programme, at devika@humanrightsinitiative.org no later than 4 pm on 31 May 2014. Proposals received after the deadline will not be considered.

We will get in touch only with short-listed applicants for further discussions on the project.
